Warrant Articles and Their **Effect on Taxes Discussed**

NE HUNDRED FORTY THREE VOTING RESI-DENTS attended the 2011 Deliberative Session, which was held on Saturday, February 5, to finalize the warrant prior to voting on Tuesday, March 8. Public Works cleared massive amounts of snow to enable parking, shuttle service was provided from the Congregational Church parking lot and the Rye Recreation

SOMETHING YOU SHOULD KNOW

Among the 37 towns in Rockingham County, Rye has the 3rd lowest tax rate (town, school and county). Only New Castle with 0.8 sq. miles of land, highway primarily State #1-B and median age of residents (1,031) 61.9 years and Newington with 4.5 sq. miles (excluding Pease), 791 residents, industrial waterfront, electrical plants and malls, are lower.

Department provided day care to encourage greater attendance. As usual, coffee and doughnuts were served.

Following the opening of the meeting by Town Moderator Bob Eaton, Joe Mills, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, presented a copy of Parsons History of the Town of Rye to Andrew Doherty for his outstanding volunteer service to the community by creating the original Town Web Site and serving as its Director for 12 years.

The budget was finalized at \$8,460,944.00, up \$293,402 over 2010 (\$8,167,542). This figure less offsetting revenue leaves \$5,821,512.00 to be raised by taxes. This figure does not include any Warrant Articles.

ARTICLE 3 ZONING ORDINANCE AMENDMENT QUESTIONS

Amendment 1: Proposed by the Rye Planning Board

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment 1 as follows:

Amend Section 505.7, A <u>Wireless Telecommunications Facilities</u> to clarify that all Wireless Telecommunications Facilities, whether located within the Wireless Telecommunications Facilities District or elsewhere, shall require a Special Use Permit from the Planning Board?

Explanation

The amendment clarifies that all proposals for Wireless Telecommunications Facilities require a Special Use Permit from the planning board, whether or not the proposal is inside or outside the Wireless Telecommunications Facilities Overlay District. A recent variance application to the zoning board of adjustment for a cell tower which would have been located outside of the Wireless Telecommunications Facilities Overlay District, raised a question as to whether a Special Use Permit would be required if the variance were granted. (That variance application to the ZBA was withdrawn)

Amendment 2 as follows:

Amend Section 403.4, F Conservation Land Developments and Section 402.3, F Multi-Family Dwellings and Multi-Family Developments to require the planning board to impose conditions on the approval of workforce housing which shall assure that the approved number of workforce housing units remain permanently available for workforce housing as defined by RSA 674:58. Such conditions may include requirements for restrictive covenants and/or liens?

Explanation

Legal mechanisms which assure that dwelling units approved as workforce housing remain available to the workforce over time, such as covenants and lien requirements, are complex legal instruments. There is limited experience in New Hampshire with such mechanisms, and experience with them is still evolving in other communities. The planning board believes that it would be better to develop such mechanisms on an application by application basis than to amend its regulations to provide a standard mechanism. Such an approach will allow the planning board to tailor the legal instruments to the specific characteristics of a workforce housing proposal and also to take advantage of newer mechanisms and legal instruments that may evolve in other communities.

Amendment 3: Proposed by the Rye Planning Board

Amend Section 702.4, D <u>Decisions of Board</u> to require that zoning board of adjustment (ZBA) decisions and minutes must be available within 5 business days and amend Section 703 <u>Rehearing and Appeal</u> to state that the 30 day period for filing a Motion for Rehearing begins on the day following the ZBA decision and that a Motion for Rehearing may be amended if the minutes and notice of decision are not available within 5 business days?

Explanation

This "Housekeeping" Amendment changes sections of the zoning ordinance regarding Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) minutes and appeals from ZBA decisions in order to make them consistent with recent changes in state statutes

Amendment 4: Proposed by the Rye Planning Board

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment 4 as follows:

Amend Section 803.4 <u>Penalties</u> to make it clear that civil penalties for zoning ordinance violations are as allowed by New Hampshire statutes, so that the ordinance does not have to be amended each time the Legislature changes the penalties?

Explanation

The amendment assures that civil penalties for zoning ordinance violations remain consistent with state statutes as the statutes change. In the Rye Zoning Ordinance civil penalties for a violation may not exceed \$100. State statutes now allow civil penalties of \$275 for the first violation and \$550 for the second violation.

Amendment 5: Proposed by the Rye Planning Board

The amendment incorporates the state statutory requirement that for an application for a Wireless Telecommunications Fawhich is visible in another municipality within a 20 mile radius, the municipality be notified. The amendment also identifies who is responsible for providing the notice.

Amendment 7: Proposed by the Rye Planning Board

Amend the AQUIFER PROTECTION DIS-TRICT by adding the following two new sections relative to protection of the Rye Water District (RWD) wells: 306.9 Wellhead Protection Area which is 4000 ft. radius around the Bailey Brook and Cedar Run wells and which is determined based on hydrological information for the Garland Road well; and 306.10 Sanitary Protective Radius, which is a protective radius of 400 around each of the RWD's three wells?

Explanation

The amendment adds references in the zoning ordinance to existing well protection requirements established by NH Department of Environmental Services regulations. Thus, all regulations regarding protection of subsurface water resources will be referenced in one place in the zoning ordinance.

To see if the Town will vote to enact the following ordinance regulating the noise levels of motorcycles:

An Ordinance Regulating the Noise **Levels of Motorcycles**

WHEREAS, on a daily basis the residents of Rye contend with noise pollution from various sources. A chief contributor of this excessive noise is motorcycle exhaust systems; and

WHEREAS, to mitigate noise pollution, The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has codified a motorcycle and a motorcycle exhaust system labeling program at 40 C.F.R. Section 205.158, 205.169, respectively, which requires motorcycle and motorcycle exhaust system manufacturers to attach a permanent label to their manufactured products stating that the product meets the EPA's noise emission requirements; and

Art. 20: A Yes vote would create a Heritage Fund in which the Commission could deposit gifts and withdraw monies to maintain the structure.

A No vote would not establish the fund.

Art. 21: a Yes vote would approve a Selectment's Ordinance on blasting.

A No vote would not approve the Ordinance.

Art. 22: a Yes vote would approve the amendment to the Parking Ordinance.

A No vote would not approve the amendment.

Art. 23: A Yes vote would approve this approach to reducing motorcycle noise in Rye, if current litigation against North Hampton is concluded and the legality of this ordinace is upheld.

A No vote would cancel the ordinance.

WHEREAS, the purpose of the labels is to ensure that specific motorcycles and exhaust systems fully comply with their tested noise emission requirements; and

WHEREAS, other municipalities including Boston, Denver and Fairfax County, Virginia have enacted ordinances requiring exhaust system labels to mitigate excessive noise pollution; and

WHEREAS, RSA 31:39(n) authorizes towns in New Hampshire to enact ordinances regulating noise levels,

NOW THEREFORE, the Town of Rye enacts the following regulations:

- 1. No person shall operate a motorcycle within the Town of Rye manufactured after December 31, 1982, that does not bear the required applicable EPA exhaust system label pursuant to C.F.R. Title 40, Volume 24, Part 205, Subparts D and E and any subsequent amendments thereto.
- 2. Any person who violates this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation and shall be fined not less than \$200 or more than \$500.
- 3. Any person guilty of a subsequent violation of this ordinance occurring at least 10 days after a first violation shall be guilty of a violation and fined not less than \$500 or more than \$1000.
- 4. The Police Department shall be responsible for enforcing this ordinance.
- 5. The provisions of this ordinance are severable. If any provision is invalidated by a court, the other provisions shall remain in effect.
- 6. This ordinance shall not take effect until all litigation against North Hampton involving a similar ordinance has been concluded and the legality of the North Hampton ordinance is upheld.

Both money and non-money articles prompted vigorous discussion throughout this 2011 Deliberative Session. Following is a summary of the most discussed Articles for your consideration:

Article #4 New Backhoe/Loader: Article #4 asks for \$110,000 to replace the 2001 backhoe/loader via bonds or notes of which \$25,000 will be repaid in 2011. This is our most heavily used piece of highway equipment. It has 6,000 hours of use and is at the end of its life without major (\$10,000 to \$20,000) repair. It is becoming a safety issue. It is a must have piece of equipment that is used daily.

Articles #5-10 Collective Bargaining:

New three-year union contract negotiations were concluded recently. Articles #5, #7 and #9 ask your approval to fund the bargaining agreements with Town, Police and Fire unions, respectively. As always during negotiations, we strive to walk a fine line between what is fair to the taxpayer and a level of compensation that will keep us competitive among our neighboring communities. Drop below that level, to quote Police Chief Kevin Walsh, "and other towns come shopping." It is not cost effective to constantly find ourselves training and outfitting new hires only to lose them after a couple of years.

Article 11 Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund:

Currently, only \$41,729.00 remains in this fund. With the cost of a highway truck ranging between \$55,000 and \$125,000, it is apparent that this fund should be rebuilt in preparation for major repair and/or future purchases.

Please go to the Town web site and click Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). Beginning on page 20, you can review the various pieces of highway equipment including description, use, history, estimated life expectancy, cost to replace, replacement schedule, and rationale.

Article #12 Town Employees Accumulated Leave Account:

This article requests \$50,000. This account is used to pay severance benefits

in accordance with the Town's Personnel Policy. The Town is advised by the Department of Revenue Administration to maintain an amount in this account equivalent to 50% of our total liability (the amount that would be required if all eligible employees left or retired at once). At this writing our total liability is \$447,300; which means that we should have \$223,650 in this account. Currently the account has \$147,635. Approval of Article #12 will bring the account to \$197,635, within \$26,015 of DRA guidelines.

Article #13 Police Cruiser requests approval for a new police cruiser at \$39,787.00. Purchase is at *no cost to the taxpayers* as the funds will be taken from user fees accumulated in the Outside Detail Fund.

Article #14 Hiring of Consultant for Town Hall \$40,000:

The Rye Town Hall is a former Methodist Episcopal Society meeting house built in 1839. One addition was constructed in 1890 and another in 1974. For some time the selectmen have been increasingly aware that no capital upgrades or major decisions concerning the future of the Town Hall building should be made until we have a structural analysis of the building and a vision of the business use needs of the Town to accommodate 21st century technology as they relate to this historic structure.

An energy audit was completed in 2009. Structural analysis of the roof support and foundation of the Town Hall has been completed. This analysis did not include other components of the existing building or a space analysis. Approval of Article #14 will allow us to take the next step and hire an architectural/engineering consultant for further study.

Article #15 asks voters to approve the addition of \$5,000 to the Municipal Buildings Maintenance Fund. This fund is used for major repairs in any of our municipal buildings.

Article #16 requests \$5,000 for the Recreation Capital Reserve Fund. During 2010, the Recreation Department suffered damage to the recreation build-

ing at the Recreation Area from both water and tree blow down.

Article #17 Operating Budget \$8,460,944.00:

There was more discussion concerning the operating budget this year than in recent memory. Some attendees appeared to be unaware of the budget process that began in early September with scrutiny first by the Board of Selectmen followed by that of the Budget Committee. All meetings were posted as required. It should be noted that there were just six members of the public present at the Public Hearing held on the budget by the Budget Committee despite posting at all of our regular locations including the town web site.

Article #18 Establish a Heritage Commission:

Built in 1943 as part of the WWII Harbor Defense System, Pulpit Rock Tower was owned by the U.S. Government until 1978 when the General Services Administration conveyed the tower to the State of N.H. Fish and Game Department. In 2001, Fish and Game indicated to the Town that they had no further use for the tower and were anxious to convey it.

Meanwhile, birds and bats had gained access to the interior of the tower. Estimates to clean the tower averaged \$10,000 and thoughts of acquisition by the town were moved to the back burner. In 2008, a proposal from Verizon to install a cell tower at the site drew passionate opposition from homeowners in the area. The combination of opposition to a cell tower and a desire to preserve the historic structure served to spur the formation of The Friends of Pulpit Rock Tower, with Patricia Weathersby as spokesperson.

The Friends of Pulpit Rock Tower has cleaned and sealed the tower, repaired safety issues such as railings, held open houses, successfully had the tower placed on the National Register of Historic Places and, most recently, agreed to pay for a structural analysis.

Meanwhile, the selectmen worked to determine the most appropriate way to acquire the tower. We have been firm

Beach parking decals have arrived and are available for purchase. The fee, \$20.00 per vehicle, remains the same as last year. To be eligible for a Beach Parking Permit you must be a Rye resident or property owner. A vehicle registration must be presented for each permit requested. NH privacy laws no longer allow us to look up your plate number. If you have trouble getting in to the office to purchase your permit, you may apply either through the mail or on the internet. For mail-in requests, please include a copy of the registration for each permit requested. A stamped, self-addressed envelope is also required if done by mail. For internet requests, provide a plate number and state of registration for each vehicle. Your status as a resident or property owner will be verified before the Beach Parking Permit is issued.

Dog Licenses. All dog owners are reminded to license their dogs by the end of April. A current rabies certificate is required to license your dog. If

that acquisition must not bind future taxpayers and, although we compromised by agreeing not to pursue a cell tower for that location, we have insisted that radio equipment for our emergency management team would be allowed.

Several scenarios for the transfer of Pulpit Rock Tower to the Town of Rye have been explored and rejected. We have also conferred with Paula Merritt, Chairman of the Historic District Commission (which is regulatory in nature within finite areas of the Town: the Historic District at Rye Center, the Isles of Shoals, the Brackett Massacre Site and the Cable House) and with Alex Herlihy, Chairman of the Historical Society, a private group that runs and maintains the Town Museum. After discussion with their respective memberships, both agreed that establishment of a separate Heritage Commission (although RSA 673:44-b would allow a combined Historic District/ Heritage Commission) is the most appropriate means to acquire Pulpit Rock Tower. The selectmen concur. Such a Heritage Commission is non-regulatory and community wide. It can acquire and manage property and property rights.

A Heritage Commission has the ability to serve the Town beyond acquisition and maintenance of property as it has advisory and review authority to survey and inventory cultural resources, assist the Planning Board in development and review of the Master Plan with regard to cultural resources and advise, upon request, other agencies and other local boards in their review of requests on matters affecting or potentially affecting cultural and historic resources. A Heritage Commission can also receive and expend funds such as gifts of money, grants, fees and bequests as well as receive property, both real and personal (RSA 673:4-a Heritage Commissions and RSA 673:44-b Powers).

Article #19 Authorize Heritage Commission to Acquire Pulpit Rock Tower:

It was announced that the Structural Engineering Evaluation from Emanuel Engineering referenced earlier was re-

ceived literally on the eve of the Deliberative Session and has yet to be fully digested. That said, the repair estimate is clear. Restoration of Pulpit Rock Tower is estimated at \$120,300 (less the \$5,000 committed by the Friends for this evaluation). Approximately 1/3 of this amount is the cost of scaffolding the eight story structure. It is also estimated that 20 years from now an additional \$70,000 will be required in addition to an annual budget of \$2,500 per year.

After much discussion, the following amendment was approved and added to the article, "The Board of Selectmen shall not initiate activities to acquire Pulpit Rock Tower until at least \$90,000 is committed in writing to be donated to the Heritage Fund from private and grant funds, and shall not acquire the tower until the Heritage Fund balance exceeds \$130,000."

Article #20 \$1 to Establish a Heritage Fund:

One dollar, approved by voters, is required to establish a Heritage Fund and, thereby, provide the proper avenue to account for fees, gifts, grants, bequests or other monies designated for activities of a Heritage Commission.

Article #23 Ordinance Regulating Noise Levels of Motorcycles:

Although many present at the Deliberative Session were concerned about excessive motorcycle noise, the debate focused on whether or not the proposed noise ordinance would be enforceable if approved. Currently, North Hampton is in court over implementation of this ordinance. Ultimately, the article was amended to the effect that if approved it will not take effect until the North Hampton litigation is concluded and the ordinance upheld.

Article #24 Rescind RSA 40:13 – SB2:

Rye has now been voting annually in March under the provisions of RSA 40:13—Senate Bill 2 for more than a decade. Article #24 asks the question, "Should we return to the traditional Town Meeting?" There are pros and cons on each side.

Under SB2, voters gather to discuss and debate warrant articles and have the

ability to amend them before going to the polls in March to vote on them. Voters not present for the explanation and discussion of the Deliberative Session also have the right to vote in March; but lack the benefit of the debate. Some argue that they will get the information from neighbors and from reading newspapers, this newsletter, and other sources.

Under Town Meeting rules, voters meet to discuss, amend, and vote most questions in open meeting on the same day. The official ballot is only for election of officers and certain other questions for which it is required by state law. If people are out of town or in the service, they cannot vote. In general, fewer people make the decisions for the town; but their votes may be more informed.

At the Saturday Deliberative Session, several speakers noted that they missed the traditional Town Meeting and valued hearing arguments on both sides of issues first hand.

We look forward to seeing you at the polls Tuesday, March 8, 2011.

If you are age 65 or over as of April 1, 2011, your primary residence is in Rye, and you have been a resident of New Hampshire for three years prior to April 1, 2011, you may want to find out if you qualify for the Elderly Exemption. If you qualify, this exemption will reduce your tax bill. There are income and asset limits and other requirements in order to receive this exemption.

The Veteran's Credit—Application Deadline is April 15, 2011

Veterans whose service period meets State requirements should find out if they qualify for the Veteran's credit of \$500 towards their tax bill.

Chief Walsh Welcomes Spring, But . . .

Warm weather is approaching and people will be walking their dogs on the beaches. As a reminder, please pick up after your dog. Most people adhere to the ordinance and pick up after their dogs; however, a few do not and thanks to the residents who remind them they must clean up. Beginning Saturday May 28, dogs are not allowed on the beaches between 9 a.m. and 7 p.m.. All dogs must have a collar on with the license attached.

Beach permits for vehicles: Please do not forget to purchase your 2011 beach parking permit and put it on the left side rear window. Parking enforcement reports many residents complain about receiving a ticket, however, they almost always use the excuse they forgot to get their sticker. Also, the beaches of Rye are dry—NO ALCOHOL.

We continue speed enforcement in your neighborhoods. We believe this high visibility policing strategy will help prevent other crimes. During the summer of 2010, Rye Police conducted traffic check points. 55 motorcycles were checked for noise and equipment violations. 5 motorcycles were found to be in violation of a State law. The operators of the motorcycles in violation were summonsed and/or issued a defective equipment tag requiring the operator to fix the violation and have the motorcycle inspected at a stateapproved inspection station. The Rye Police continue to work with other law enforcement agencies and together we can make a difference in quieting the motorcycle noise.

In closing, I would like to thank everyone for their support over the last year. I sincerely appreciate everyone's encouragement and look forward to the coming years.

Planning Board Lists Warrant Articles and New Projects

Article 3 on the Warrant contains seven Amendments for your consideration. Some were written to bring the Rye Zoning Ordinances up to date with state regulations. An important amendment will protect Rye's aquifer, a valued resource, by clearly defining the Wellhead Protection Area. Others were needed for clarification of existing ordinances including a "housekeeping amendment" and one for protection of public safety pertaining to fireworks. We ask that you take time to review these articles and ask for your support on Election Day.

We welcome Bill Epperson who recently joined the Board as an alternate. We send our wholehearted thanks to Martin Zivic who resigned for personal reasons— we value the dedication and commitment he made during his years as a member of the Planning Board. Lastly, we thank Bob Brown. who volunteered to take Martin Zivic' place on the Board until the March elections.

Recently, the Board has met with the Building Inspector and the ZBA chairman in a work session to discuss issues we normally do not have time to discuss at regular Board meetings that are primarily geared to addressing applications. The intent of this meeting was to review the Land Development Regulations and Zoning Oridnances as they interact with Rye today. Current topics include beach access for Rye residents, review of commercial/residential zoning, condo conversions and annual certification programs for developments. The next work session will be held in May.

The Planning Board continues to review the Hoefle Subdivision located on Grove Road and work with the applicant, Town Engineer, Town Attorney and Hydrogeologist on the issues pertaining to this application, drainage and protection of the Aquifer. In addition to this application, which will be heard on March 8, 2011, there will be a conceptual consultation for the motel at 23 Locke Road to become townhouses and potentially the Wentworth by the Sea, Beach and Swim Club on Ocean Blvd., pending their Feb-

Finally, two citizens' petitions ask the Town if it wants to return to the town meeting form of government that it abandoned in 1998, and if it wants to adopt a motorcycle noise ordinance that adopts stricter standards than those imposed by the State. The School District ballot contains additional articles asking vot-

Building Inspector Lists Permit Requirements

Now that the winter snow is a distant memory, and we are all looking forward to post-winter yard repairs, and dreaming of improvements to our houses, we suggest you make an appointment with us to discuss your ideas in the pre-planning stages so we can help you navigate through the possibly challenging maze of regulations.

What requires a Building Permit??

Any work that involves an addition, reconfiguration, alteration, repair, or demolish needs a permit. Also requiring permits are fences, pools, sheds, stonewalls, generators, pool equip-

ment, patios, decks, and anything else that may impact zoning, such as percent coverage and setbacks. Pool equipment and generators need to meet setbacks.

Work involving plumbing or electrical, gas or heating systems, requires a separate permit.

What does not require a Building Permit?

Cosmetic improvements of your home, such as paint-

ing, carpets, cabinets, countertops, built-ins, tiles, and repairs to walls and doors so long as the structural members are not changed.

What is required to be submitted with a Building Permit Application?

Permit applications must include a

sketch of what exists, and what you intend to do. The application must include a representative sketch of the property lines and wetlands and other important features for us to review for zoning and State compliance. State Energy Code approval is also required if your expansion exceeds 100 square feet. Drainage issues have become a challenge for all of us. You are now required to consider the ramifications of residential runoff during any construction project.

Rye Sewer Department

Sewer Moratorium

The State of New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services has issued a sewer connection moratorium to the Town of Hampton and Rye based on capacity concerns at Hampton's Waste Water Treatment Plant. It pertains not only to new physical sewer connections, but to any increase in wastewater flow to the wastewater treatment system which is in Hampton. Thus it includes any change of use for an existing connection that results in an increased wastewater flow. For more information, contact the Building Inspection/Code Enforcement Department and/or Sewer Department.

Installers License

Any person, contractor, or plumber who will be installing sewer pipes and making sewer connections in Rye must be licensed by the Town. The cost of the Installers License is one hundred dollars (one-time fee) and can be obtained at the Sewer Department.

The Sewer Department Office is located on the second floor of Town Hall and is opened Monday–Friday, 8 a.m.–12 p.m. For more information, contact the Sewer Department at 964-6815.
