2) January Meeting Minutes Approval

In the interest of our Guest's time, we did not approve the minutes from January.

3) Conversation with NH State Representative Jaci Grote

We had a productive and educational discussion with Representative Grote. We discussed upcoming energy related House bills. Representative Grote explained the process for advocating for or against a bill and said it is important to get as many municipalities involved as possible. It is important to relate advocacy to specific community issues or initiatives.

The bills the Energy Committee is following are:

- HB 213 This bill would effectively reduce NH's Renewable Portfolio Standard (RPS) from 25% in 2025 to just under 9% in 2035. This is significantly lower than all other New England states, particularly Maine, Vermont and Massachusetts. New Hampshire currently ranks 41st in the nation for solar use (this was a drop in national rank). Research shows that between 2014 and 2019, small scale solar saved NH residents and utilities \$83 million.
- HB 225 This bill would reset net metering credit to wholesale prices. This is a significant reduction and will negatively impact small solar arrays the most. Small scale solar saves <u>all</u> NH residents money by reducing the amount of energy the utilities need to buy.

- HB 315 This bill has the potential to derail RSA-53A, the "Community Power" law. Rye Energy Committee has been working with other communities to learn about Community Power and hopes to offer a warrant article in 2022 for residents to vote on. With Community Power, all Rye resident and business electric use would be aggregated to buy as one entity. Buying in bulk would help us to attain lower energy prices and choose more renewable options. Anyone could opt out of the plan and use the default (Eversource) supply. Eversource would remain the utility for the delivery of energy. However this bill, that was written by Eversource, would significantly reduce the benefits of RSA-53A..
- HB 549 This bill would reduce the systems benefit charge and weaken the proposed Triennial Efficiency Plan. Residents, businesses and municipalities benefit from the NHSaves program to increase energy efficiency and in doing so, support local businesses. Lighting upgrades in Rye buildings will produce 20% energy savings.

Letters will be prepared regarding these House Bills. The letters will be presented to the Select Board and, with approval, be signed by the Energy Committee, Select Board, and Representative Grote.

It was noted that 66% of buildings in town use fuel oil, 24% use propane, 7% use electricity and 3% use something else.

The Energy Committee will get on the agenda for the Select Board meeting for 2/8 to present the letters and to talk more about Community Power.

4) School/Solar Update

The Solar PPA is still in process. Town/School deliberative meeting dates have been pushed out to June due to Covid. We are planning to have a webinar with the School Board, Revision Energy and the Energy Committee to present the project to the Rye community and answer any questions. Tentatively, it is scheduled for May 18 at 7 pm.

5) Community Power

- Should Rye join the Community Power Coalition of NH? We briefly discussed this. If we join, we would have access to great resources as we research and develop a plan for Rye. We will discuss this further at a later date as the proposed legislation (HB315) would significantly impact Community Power for the entire state.

6) Letter to Public Utilities Commission (PUC) to support Triennial Efficiency Plan

This is letter will be very similar to above letter about HB549. The letter to the PUC will be in support of the Triennial Efficiency Plan.

7) Exeter Solar Project

This was tabled due to time.

8) Lighting Upgrade Update

The library equipment has been received and installation will be complete soon. There has been a delay in some of the equipment for the town garage prior to starting installation. We hope to renew the proposal Public Safety building.

9) New Business

We will submit an article for the Town newsletter by 2/16.
