2. August Meeting Minutes Approval; agenda review

The Button Up workshops are funded by NHSaves. Lisa will coordinate with NHSaves and Portsmouth to pick date, location and get promotional materials finalized.

6. Rye 400 celebration

We plan to work on a brochure that documents the history of power in Rye, perhaps detailing grist mills, the advent of electricity and power lines up to the present.

7. Community Power update

An update on Community Power will be written and sent to Select Board members. We are hoping for Select Board approval of the modified Energy Aggregation Plan that was approved by voters in March. The modifications are minor – updating tenses to reflect the progress made to date and adding additional technical explanation of elements that are in the original plan as requested by the Public Utilities Commission.

The Community Power Coalition of NH (CPCNH) has completed a successful Request for Proposals (RFP) process and is negotiating contracts with vendors for Financial and Banking Services, Retail Customer Services, Energy Portfolio Management, and Member Services.

The City of Lebanon (a CPCNH Member) was the first municipality in the state of NH to have it Energy Aggregation Plan approved! The Rye Energy Aggregation Plan is written using a template based on Lebanon's plan.

Once the Select Board approves the modifications to Rye's Energy Aggregation Plan, the town administrator will submit the plan to the Public Utilities Commission. The Energy Committee will assist with this by providing a template and the necessary contacts.
